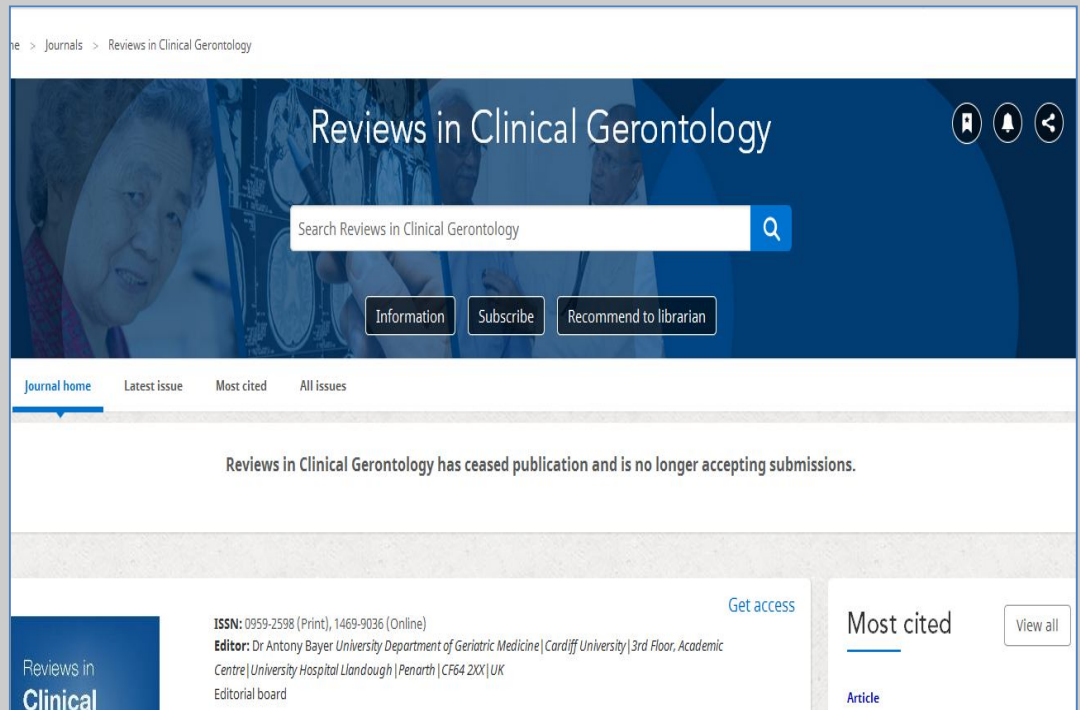

Brief History

Reviews in Clinical Gerontology was established in 1991 and is published by Cambridge University Press. The editor-in-chief is Antony Bayer (Cardiff University).

Scope and Coverage

Reviews in Clinical Gerontology brings together specially commissioned international reviews on recent developments in geriatric medicine (including rehabilitation, nursing care and psychiatry of old age) and in biological, psychological and social gerontology. There is systematic coverage of the literature on a cyclical basis. All the major topics of interest are reviewed during the course of a five-year cycle. The issues build into a valuable source of reference for everyone working with elderly people.

Digital archive 1991-1996: *Reviews in Clinical Gerontology* Digital archive contains approximately 154 articles from the journal's first 6 volumes - 12 issues in total.

Kind of Information

Reviews in Clinical Gerontology holds all the articles that are published on Geriatric medicine and in biological, psychological and social gerontology and all these articles are reviewed by reviewer/experts and are kept in volume formats.

The abstract text reads: 'In this review we identified cohort and cross-sectional studies that assessed pain in community-dwelling older people (>65 years) reliably characterized as frail. Secondly, we considered biologically plausible mechanisms that may alter pain perception, or contribute to, or exacerbate pain in an older person with frailty. Thirdly, we considered specific implications of pain management for this group of people. From the limited data from the seven included studies, it would appear that the presence of pain is higher in older people with frailty compared with people characterized as pre-frail or not frail. Thus older people reporting pain are more likely to be frail. However, a lack of prospective data precludes inferences about the direction of the relationship: that is whether pain or frailty is the antecedent. Further research is needed to understand the direction of the relationship, and to identify appropriate pain management strategies for older people with frailty.' After selecting a particular review, it is seen that each review article comes with an abstract. The title of the article, reviewers name with designation etc. comes with DOI number and online publication date. Each article also shows the volume number, issues number, page number in which they belongs to. Articles can be downloaded in PDF format. Even it can be seen in HTML format. Citations can be export. Request can be made through the 'Permission' link. Copy right issues, corresponding authors information, references are given in the last portion of an article in supporting an article. All the references are linked to their original source.

Arrangement Pattern

Volumes are arranged era wise and then year wise (Such as...2010s contains all the volumes from 2010-2015). Under each year/volume issues are arranged chronologically. In an issue articles are arranged date wise (published online).
